What You Need

- **1.** Current photo of participant
- 2. Yellow DOT medical information form
- 3. Yellow DOT folder



How to use the Yellow DOT Program

Have a Photo Taken



Place the Photo on Medical Information Form

Place the photograph in the space indicated on the emergency medical information form. The photograph should be a clear, recent photo of just the Yellow DOT participant.



Step Three

Complete Medical Form

Complete the emergency medical form, including the participant's name, emergency contacts, personal physician, medical conditions, recent surgeries and medications.





Attach Yellow DOT Decal

Place the Yellow DOT decal outside on the left side of the rear-facing window. This will alert first responders to look in the glove compartment for your emergency medical information.





Place Information in Your Glove Compartment



The final step is to place the medical information form with photo attached in the Yellow DOT folder and place folder in your glove compartment where trained first responders will look when they see a Yellow DOT on the rear window.
